H.E The Ambassador of Ireland

H.E The Ambassador of Ireland humorously outlined the way his family urged him to keep his speech short, and "free of dad jokes", lightening the tone. He conveyed the integrity necessary in this conference, and of course the diversity of cultures present. Tying in with the theme of power equality, he intelligently alluded to the system of hierarchy in Golding's famous "Lord of the Flies", along with the analogy of "big school kids having the power", using them as cautionary tales to promote equality, leaving the anarchy of the ancient world behind. This was then supported by overcoming hardship through unity, the way "from the ashes of the holocaust they built the United Nations united".

H.E The Ambassador of The Republic of Ecuador

H.E The Ambassador of The Republic of Ecuador unravelled the importance of human rights, but perhaps more specifically: women's rights, because without women's rights, there are no human rights. She placed emphasis on the novelty women bring into the labour market yet outlined the lack of spotlight placed on such women. Concerned, she explained the way 30% of managers are women (only), with most of them being in careers related to human resources, teaching, or accounting, with very few in STEM. Within the board of directors, the numbers drop significantly. In Latin America, for example, only about 9% of women hold directing positions, and she hence stresses the unease due to such issues, encouraging more female voices to be heard.
